A curriculum is designed around organizing principles and essential concepts.

CURRICULUM:

Is intentionally designed.

Allows for in-depth exploration.

Measures depth of understanding.

Emphasizes high-quality instruction.

Connects previous experiences and understanding to content.

Links new knowledge to existing knowledge.

Provides new information for growth.


Orders content in a specific sequence to help a learner process and retain information.


